**Towards peace and stability in Northeast Asia**

With Cold War era political structures remaining, the crisis on the Korean Peninsula is an ongoing source of conflict in Northeast Asia, including tensions over nuclear development, the lack of relations between North Korea and its neighboring countries, and the continuing stalemate in the Six-Party Talks. Under these circumstances, the Global Partnership for the Prevention of Armed Conflict (GPPAC) in Northeast Asia has tried to ease the tensions and encourage the resumption of the Six-Party Talks. As part of this effort, a GPPAC delegation consisting of civil society representatives from Japan, South Korea, China, Russia and Mongolia will come to discuss practical ways to end the stalemate of the Six-Party Talks and create a regional framework for future peace and stability in Northeast Asia. Please come join in this discussion.

An international GPPAC delegation is scheduled to visit Pyongyang in early December, 2010. This roundtable discussion will serve as the foundation for the future of peace dialogue in the region.
